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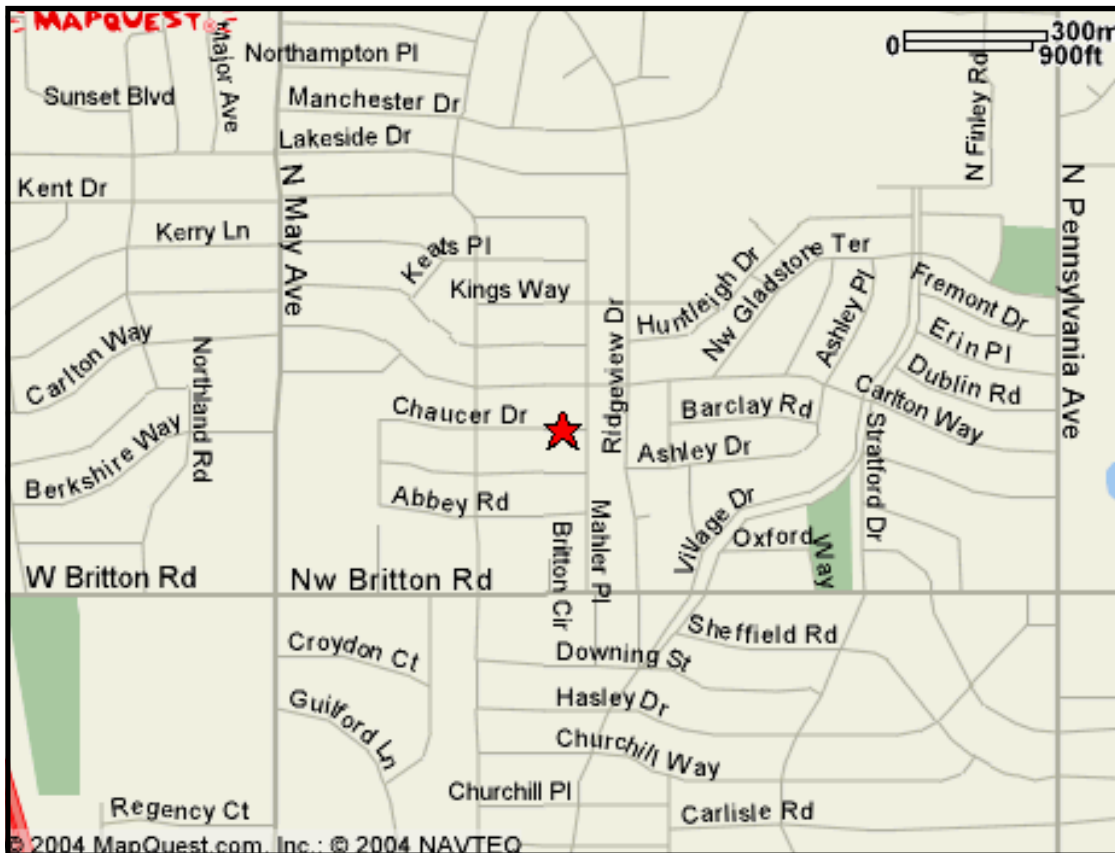
The December meeting of the Central Oklahoma Grotto will be held at the home of Sue and John Bozeman at 8:00 p.m. on Friday, December 9, 2005.

## TRIP REPORTS

### Trip Report: Greene's Cathedral

The weather was ideal for terrestrial human activity: sunny, mild, with only a light breeze, so we began our work by surveying overland. We started above the resurgence overlooking the creek. Several 100' shots put us at a sink that we designated Liverwort Seep, the larger of the two that we tied in to the existing survey. Despite draining a rather large surface area, it appeared not to be enterable by humans; detritus, limbs, collapsed rock and fill have sealed it to us for now.

In contrast, the second and smaller sink, named Mossy Banks, was cool and inviting with a virtual train-tunnel for an entrance. Fifteen feet beyond however, the ceiling height lowered, opened up for another 15 feet then, fractionated into a complex 3-dimensional maze. Though we initially intended upon surveying as we went, the complexity was such that we decided to first size-up our survey quarry. Indeed, it took Jon and me a considerable amount of time just to find our way down to the watercourse, despite it being only some 20 linear feet away. At one point, before I had found my own way, Jon was within earshot but I could not seem to find my way to follow, even when the glow of his light was in view. Once we were both down to the water's path (a tight, but going solutional passage beneath breakdown) we decided to push onward. Meanwhile, Sue and John were exploring the upper complex. After awhile they began surveying toward the squeeze through which Jon and I had disappeared.

What we found was a difficult passage that leads to a high, dry upper room, with mounds of fill encrusted with stained popcorn. We briefly scrambled around the roughly 15' x 50' irregularly shaped chamber, and then returned to the water's path below. Beyond the small chamber, the path continues as a completely solutional, narrow slot that snakes away toward the deeper bowels of the system. The going is rather difficult and not for the stocky caver, but appears to hold some promise for connecting to the other branches of Greene's.

It took Jon and me some 30-plus minutes to make our way back 100' (approximately) to where the Bozemens were working, and we were tired when we reached them. Sue and John had continued the survey a ways further beyond the drip-line, and

moved some rock and fill to facilitate surveying on future trips. Speaking of future trips, who is up for surveying some virginal cave passage?

Roy had hoped to achieve one of two objectives, smoking a connection between Crystal Cham-



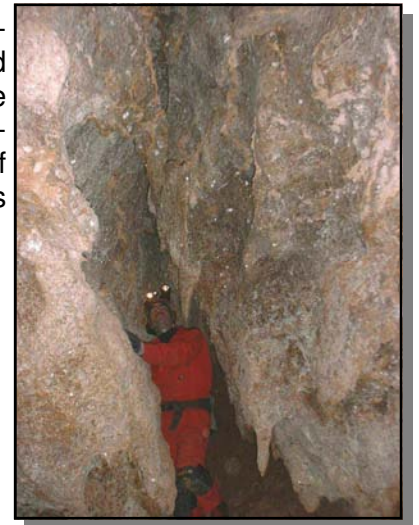

tical slot connecting the upper section of the cave to the lower section of the cave. Roy and Dale negotiated the slot and pushed into the infamous "Linguini Crawl." Along the way we encountered many large clusters of Cave Myotis and a few individual Pips.

After exiting the cave, we did some surface reconnaissance. Dale, Lil, and Mark attempted to enter the Mossy Bank entrance, but a rock fall blocked the passage. Fortunately, no one was hurt and the plan is to re-excavate the passage at some future visit.
